Access: Ensuring that systems are designed so everyone can fully participate in public and professional life.



Grant LOVES "schoo" as he calls it. He's excited to go! When Grant was three years old it became clear a traditional preschool setting wasn't possible. At just 15 months old Grant was diagnosed with Lennox-Gastaut syndrome, a severe seizure disorder. He also has a global developmental delay, autism and seizures. Two years after enrolling in Easterseals Approved Private School Program, Grant has grown more than his family could ever have imagined. In just two short years, Grant, who is nonverbal, can communicate simple every day things in his own way like requesting drinks of water or choosing what he'd

Maggie is an energetic preteen who loves her family and pets. At just three months old, she was diagnosed with epilepsy and development delays. Then, in preschool she was diagnosed with an intellectual disability. When Maggie was little, she was able to enroll in the same activities as her twin with some tweaks. However, once she started kindergarten, she needed to participate in activities with other individuals with disabilities and found Easterseals' Challenger baseball program. After baseball, she participated in other Easterseals activities. These programs have allowed her to make friends and interact with her peers and adult helpers in a meaningful way.

Jen, Maggie's mother commented, "We know Maggie will need a lifetime of care and support. We anticipate as she gets older, she will benefit from more of Easterseals' programs...We feel fortunate to have found Easterseals." Sam is a very active high school student who participates in a variety of sports and engages with his friends, fellow students and teachers throughout the school. He was diagnosed with Down syndrome at birth and began services at Easterseals at 3 years of age. When he first came to Easterseals, Sam was only able to say a few words and had difficulty communicating with others. Speech therapy helps Sam learn functional skills to say words clearer and speak in sentences. His new communication skills enable him to easily follow directions and prepare for his future.




Ella is a smart, kind, loving, artistic, animal-loving little girl. Ella also happens to have autism and a global developmental delay, which she was diagnosed with at 2 years old. Currently, Ella is considered nonverbal, but she uses some verbal words, sounds, and many American Sign Language (ALS) signs to communicate. Ella was introduced to an Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC) device to communicate as well. Ella started going to Easterseals shortly after her diagnosis. Since starting at Easterseals, Ella has been in an inclusive environment, receiving Central Intermediate Unit #10 (CIU) services, participating in daily activities and routines, expanding on her different modes of communication, and making friends and connections. Easterseals has been a supportive resource for Ella's family as they learn to navigate parenting a child with her needs.

Participants By Race/Ethnicity




Participants By Age

Founder, Edgar Allen

Tragedy Leads to Inspiration

In 1907, Ohio businessman Edgar Allen lost his son in a streetcar accident. The inadequate medical services available to save his son prompted Allen to sell his business and launch a fundraising campaign to build a hospital in his hometown of Elyria, Ohio. Once the hospital was established, Allen was surprised to discover that the staff would often conceal children with disabilities from public view. Motivated to make a difference, Allen founded the National Society for Crippled Children in 1919, which became the first organization of its kind. In the spring of 1934, the organization launched its first Easter "seals" campaign to raise funds for its services. Donors showed their support by placing these seals on envelopes and letters. Cartoonist J.H. Donahey from the Cleveland Plain Dealer designed the first seal, inspired by the right to live a "normal" life.


Following World War II, the organization recognized the growing needs of returning veterans and their families. The National Society for Crippled Children expanded its mission to provide comprehensive services tailored specifically to adults and veterans re-entering civilian life. These programs addressed employment opportunities, physical rehabilitation, and community reintegration, offering critical support to people who had dedicated themselves to the nation's service. This expansion not only highlighted the organization's adaptability but also underscored its commitment to fostering independence and dignity for all individuals during a pivotal moment in American history.


Americans with Disabilities Act

Prior to the passing of the ADA on July 26, 1990, Easterseals was a leading advocate for the American Disabilities Act (ADA) and actively lobbied in Washington and across the country for its adoption. Easterseals also created some of the most powerful advocacy pro-ADA public service campaign with messages to support the law and its implementation.

Franklin - Accessible Van

Residential Community Homes in Franklin added a new wheelchair-accessible van! The van helps transport up to 10 residents traveling to community events, doctor visits, and family visits.

Funding was made available through grants from the Dr. & Mrs. Arthur Williams Phillips Charitable Trust and PNC Charitable Trust.



Johnstown - New Sound Booth

Audiology Services in Johnstown has a new sound booth thanks to a grant through the City of Johnstown's American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). The office also received a new Pediatric Visual Reinforcement Audiometry (VRA), which provides the technology to test hearing in babies and toddlers as young as six months old. Dr. Sydney Black notes patients are happy with the new sound booth,

"A few Veterans reported feeling extremely

claustrophobic in the previous booth.

The new booth is well lit and larger.
Patients have experienced a lot less hesitation when entering the booth."
Another patient in a wheelchair appreciates how the sound booth is accessed without a ramp and easy to maneuver once inside the sound booth.
